One year later, the first official dawn service was held at the cenotaph and a wreath to the fallen was laid by George Patterson, one of those five men from the previous year. The crowd was some 130 strong. From here, the dawn service spread to all capital cities and many country towns.

The Cenotaph statues were modelled by LS John Varcoe from Dubbo, NSW, who had served in HMAS Parramatta and Pioneer: and Pte William Darley (15 Inf Bn and 4 Fd Amb.) The 'official' side of the memorial is that facing the post office, with the pre-

Following standdown after a long, cold night in the trenches, the soldiers returned to their breakfast and an important part of that meal was the ubiquitous cup of tea which, when possible, was laced with a 'little something extra' to give it added warmth and taste.
