

President's Update:-

As another year draws to a close, it marks the 14th year of our Association's existence. From a small contingent of former members of the New Guinea Volunteer Rifles and Papua New Guinea Volunteer Rifles Regiments marching, for the very first time on Australian soil, on ANZAC Day 1990, we now number almost 300 members, and, (I know I am assed) believe that we are now one of the best presented Units in the prisbane parade, with an average of 90—100 members making parade.



I would like to personally thank all members who have, in so many ways, made our Association what it is today. Whether you live nice and handy in Brisbane, or away somewhere in the top end, in WA or way down south in Victoria, SA, NSW or Tasmania, as well as PNG and the Solomon Islands, your contribution, no matter how big or small, is appreciated and important.

ANZAC Day 2004 marks the 30th Anniversary of the laying up of our Colours in the Australian War Memorial in Canberra. Many of our members were involved with that ceremony. er the past couple of months we have been strengthening our relations with Papua New Guinea in line with one of the objectives of our Constitution. One of our aims is to secure the Australian Service Medal (ASM) 1945 -1975 for former Nationals of the PNGVR who served in an Australian Army Reserves Unit under the Australian flag prior to Independence.

Late in October, 2003, Association Secretary Col Gould, Honorary Solicitor Bruce Crawford, OAM, and former Chief Superintendent of PNG Police, Denis Samin, OBE, made a personal trip to Port Moresby in response to an invitation to attend the 2003 Port Moresby RSL Annual Dinner and to take the opportunity to follow up a number of other Association issues. Col Gould reports:-

Our reception in Port Moresby was terrific. We were able to personally meet and discuss Association issues with senior officials from the PNG Ceremonial & Protocol Division, Commander of the PNG Defence Force, Commodore Peter Ilau, CBE and Police Commissioner Sam Inguba, QPM. With the professional help of Denis Samin, OBE as managing editor of an NQ newspaper, we made direct and rewarding contact with his counterpart of the PNG Post Courier.

Two PNG members rattled off their service numbers without hesitation. Recognition of their service is long overdue.


Our Secretary is now compiling a list of contacts and "doing the paperwork" for a submission to Canberra early next year.

During the Moresby visit, Association Vice President John Mudge, MBE along with Colin, Bruce and Denis, presented Honorary membership of the Association to Police Commissioner, Sam Inguba, QPM and Commodore Peter Ilau, CBE., in recognition of the roles played by the RPNGC and PNG soldiers, often in partnership with the NGVR, during the Second World War.

This visit has certainly strengthened our ties with PNG and senior officials. I would like to thank John Mudge, MBE who kindly provided accommodation, transport and personal support in Port Moresby. NGVR VETERANS COULD STAR IN THEIR OWN HISTORIC FILM

A private production group have offered their services to produce an initial short promotional video and solicit the funding for a film on the NGVR / PNGVR, in a similar manner that it has done for the RAAF 460 Bomber Squadron, the home of the famous G for George Lancaster Bomber housed in the Canberra War Memorial. The initial short promo would include interviews with our members about their experiences in Papua New Guinea during the war and would include some historic war time footage and still photographs complete with background music and connecting voice narrative.

The 60 minute film would be more formally structured and include more of the above, probably with current PNG footage. Much of the material is already available in the stories narrated in our Harim Tok Tok.

The final 460 Bomber Squadron (video) film is costing in excess of \$100,000 and is being funded, we understand, partly by the Netherlands and Australian Governments. The Association's Committee was shown the 460 Bomber Squadron's short promo at it's last meeting in November and was impressed with its technical quality and content. The Committee was also briefed on the project.

To produce the initial 8 minute promotional footage, the Association would need to raise \$5,000, either by

- (1) Individual sponsorship, say a minimum of \$500 (we already have a pledge of \$1,000 if the remaining \$4,000 can be secured) AND/OR
- (2) Provide contact names and phone numbers or likely sponsors so that they may be immediately approached. You may contact them yourself if you prefer. Suggestions include companies/communities which were in existence in PNG during the war-eg Qantas; Steamships; Burns Philp; WR Carpenter; Nestle (of Sunshine Powdered Milk fame); Oil Search and others.

TIME IS SHORT for this project. Our war veterans are becoming frail and the group making the offer has the resources and time frame available early in 2004. Please send your pledges, donations, suggestions or possible contact names & addressed to:-

The Association's annual award of the 'Shield of Military Excellence' took place on Saturday 1 November, 2003, at Jezzine Barracks, Townsville.

I accepted the invitation from the Executive Committee to co-ordinate this year's presentation. There were some difficulties in the early stages. As you can appreciate, troops from Townsville were on the move to and from overseas duties, which also resulted in key military personnel often being unavailable to finalise the function.

The background to the Association's award is to encourage the young (Reserve) soldiers of today to strive to excel in the various aspects of their particular military roles. Think of 'as we, the Reservists of yesterday, providing encouragement for the young Aussie troops of today.

SHIELD OF MILITARY EXCELLENCE 2003 AWARD PRESENTATION 'STEEL TUFF COMPETITION' 9 RQR—GALLIPOLI BARRACKS By Phil Ainsworth

Peter Rogers, Norm Mundy, Joe Fisk, Bob Collins, Barry Wright, Tom Dowling and Phil Ainsworth attended 9 RQR's annual exercise "STEEL TUFF" on the weekend of the 18/19 October 2003, in the Harvey Bay area.

Proceeding from Brisbane by Army Hi-Ace bus, we arrived at Maryborough at lunch time on the Saturday, allocated accommodation and taken to the exercise area in the Mary Valley State Forest, 50 km west of Maryborough. We spent

Sunday at the Maryborough Rifle Range.

As explained by the RSM, the exercise was designed to find the best section commander, best soldier and determine the champion section within the battalion for 2003, and this would be achieved by assessing individual fitness, shoot, weapon handling and battlefield skills. The champion section would need to show high levels of team work and determination to succeed. We were there as representatives of the Association to award the champion section at the completion of the exercise.

9 RQR comprises 4 rifle companies, each of about 100 soldiers and an Administration company.

The Regiment has a proud tradition dating back from the original Moreton Bay Regiment. The CO is Lt. Colonel Steve Vokes with company commanders being Majors Carl Fisher, Mike Cash, Scott Shephard and Robert Brennan respectively. The RSM is WO1 Jamie Heron.

Generally, 9 RQR is a training battalion bringing troops through recruitment, basic training to section and platcon level. The Regiment continues to contribute troops to the Australian overseas contingents.

Many individual members of our Association have been soldiers of 9 RQR, particularly after their return from PNG. More particularly, the Association had been directly associated with 9 RQR since 1997 through it's sponsoring of this highly regarded Award of Excellence. This year's competition was based in the Mary Valley State Forest, a monotonous, undulating, thick dry scrub forest, and at the Maryborough Rifle Range.

The exercise and competition comprised a tactical 35 km circuit march with 14 compulsory rendezvous, where the tests were undertaken, as well as a live shoot at the range. These tests included an all arms call for fire, a land mine incident, weapon drills, general military knowledge, navigation, first aid, a night harbour, a trailer push, run & shoot, construction of field defences, an observation and deduction exercise, a stretcher carry, section attack, claymore/trip flares/weapons test and a quick decision exercise. Bearing in mind the difficulty in navigating in the State Forest, it is significant that this very ambitious exercise was finalized in the time allotted. This says very much for the quality of the planning, resources provided and above all, the capacity of the soldiers involved.

Two sections from each company plus one composite,

each of nine soldiers were selected to compete. The continuous assessment of the soldiers by nearly 70 staff only added to the quality of the effort and result achieved. The level of fitness, knowledge and skills required to complete the tasks was most impressive. From recruitment, the personnel are continuously assessed and must meet certain levels of fitness and competency before moving on.

The type and level of training is the same as the regular army which allows relatively seamless moulding of reserve and regular soldiers when bought together. It is not well recognized that a large portion of the soldiers who comprise Australia's overseas contribution are from the Reserve.

Accordingly, training is very focused. Interestingly, the Australian Army is evolving several schemes, whereby employers are encouraged financially, backed by legislative measures for employees to join and serve without loss of employment entitlements during training and tours of duty.

After completing the exercise, we returned mid Sunday afternoon to Delta Coy's Maryborough barracks, where t' overall results of the exercise were given and awards ion the best secion commander and best soldier made by the CO and RSM. Peter Rogers followed, speaking briefly about NGVR's formation and service during WW11 and relevance today, and the uniqueness of PNGVR which served continuously overseas and was on the Australian Army's Order of Battle. Norm Mundy spoke about the Association's sponsoring of the event and together with other Association members presented the awards to soldiers of the "Champion Section".

This year's winner of the NGVR/PNGVR Shield of Military Excellence was Recon Section, Bravo Coy led by Cpl

Each soldier of Recon Section was given a 75mm diameter medallion featuring the 9 RQR Badge & PNGVR Badge and engraved with the name, rank and serial number of each soldier.

Our congratulations to Cpl Kane and Recon Section, Bravo Company for an outstanding effort. We also congratulate all of the other soldiers of 9 RQR who took part and excelled in their individual efforts during 'Steel Tuff. Written by Phil Ainsworth

FOOTNOTE:-

9 ROR—"The Fighting Ninth"

9th Battalion Royal Queensland Regiment is an integrated light infantry battalion. 9 RQR traces its history from 1867, and is credited with being the first battalion ashore at Gallipoli-member Lt Duncan Chapman at 0428 hours 25 April 1915. During the 6 months on Gallipoli the Unit lost 236 KIA and 390 wounded.

The battalion also served in the defence of Tobruk in North Africa in 1941, and the battle for Milne Bay in Papua New Guinea. The tradition of service continues today with more than 50 members volunteering for active service in East Timor.

NGVR / ARMY HISTORY OF NG2421 (NGX 419) SGT BRUCE FRASER ©

2nd November, 1945, and Bruce is still in Wewak. Extracts from another letter. "The main, almost only topic of conversation here is when are we going home!"

Tens and tens of thousands of troops, whose services are no longer required in the New Guinea area are waiting to return to Australia, but there isn't sufficient shipping available. A broadcast from Australia couple of days ago said that Britain was lending Australia eight Victory or Liberty ships to transport troops home."

I still manage to get a little more than the regular issue of grog. If the issue is one bottle of beer per man per week, I get five or six—if it's two. I finish up with eight or ten bottles. However, don't imagine that any others have to go short-it's all done by a slight mistake in addition when the unit strength figures are compiled on the day of issue from the bulk canteen store."

"We had a visit from Tom Blamey, the C-in-C last week. In order to give the old basket a chance to throw his stomach out further (his chest is now in the vicinity of his stomach) a divisional parade was held. Actually it wasn't a full div parade as the Wewak airstrip can accommodate only approximately 7,000 men. Two rehearsals were held and I was dragged into the second one. Reveille at 5.30am, breakfast at 6.00am, on parade at 6.45 am, and departed for the strip at 7.15 am Arrived back here at noon after spending the morning alternately standing and marching in the blazing sun and dust. That was enough for me. When Blamey did arrive, I, as it happened, very luckily had a small patch of prickly heat and excused myself from attending."

29th November, 1945-and Bruce is still in Wewak. This is his

"Well it looks as though I'll be leaving here for Sydney on the 15th or 16th of December, by the aircraft carrier Implacable '. It's only through the generosity of Britain that some thousands of us will be in Australia for Christmas. Britain has made available to Australia eight Liberty ships and some warships. some of which will pick up troops on their way south from Japan and China. The Implacable will pick up 5,150 of us."

Last Sunday 'HMAS Shropshire' called here and took 560 personnel to Sydney-only a few days trip. 'HMAS Vindex', an escort carrier took away 500 today. The passenger ship 'Duntroon'will take 16,000 on Saturday. Three more British naval ships are expected in a couple of days. The idea is to get

all troops away from Wewak as soon as possible as it is an unhealthy place."

I must tell you about the role I had in a Jap demilitarised cruiser last Monday. It was sent from Japan to transport 1,100 POW's back to their cherry- trees, although I think a few of them won't live long enough to see Japan. There were some very sick Japs who embarked. Anyway I was one of the party who checked the Japs coming aboard."

Bruce was discharged from the Army on the 10th January, 1946, after arriving in Sydney.

POST WAR

January 1946. Daughter Yvonne born just after discharge from

July 1946. Returned to New Guinea to mine brother's gold

1947-1949. Employed by New Guinea Goldfields in Waualluvial mining.

1949-1951. Employed by Morobe Construction Company.

1951-1979 Employed by CVSR Chemicals, at Rhodes in Sydney, as a chemical plant operator and supervisor.

1992 After his stroke, Bruce moved to Perth to be with his only daughter. Yvonne Farrant. After a major heart attack and hip fracture he was moved to the Salvation Army nursing home where he currently resides, while Rene still resides in the retirement village.










