

EULOGY Memorial Service

I am honoured today to carry out the family wishes for Major Peter Noel Harbeck, ED who was born in Deniliquin, NSW on the 13th May 1926.

I say to Lucy, Peter's wife of 22 years, and Tommi, their son, my sincere sympathy. I also extend such sympathy to Brett, Grant and Janet and Neri and Tia.

Peter's life was governed by that magnificent country, Papua New Guinea, as was many of us here today. Initially I knew Peter when he was stationed at Samarai, where incidentally our PNGVR Secretary, Colin Gould was once the Collector of Customs. During the vicious Mount Lamington earthquake on the Papua mainland, Peter rendered conspicuous humane aid and work and was officially commended by the PNG Administration.

Relocating to the Highlands of PNG, particularly in the Mt Hagen area, Peter became a coffee planter and ran the Shell and Gibbs Sepik Airways agencies. During his life in the highlands of PNG Peter Harbeck was the Officer Commanding "C" Company PNGVR, with platoons at Goroka, Banz and Mt Hagen. During his years of service in PNGVR, our service paths continually crossed and bonded into a solid friendship up to this week some 50 years on.

Peter was a loving and loyal husband and an efficient PNGVR Officer. He was selected to active attachment in Vietnam and was awarded the Efficiency Medal. Further to successful command of such unique PNG Highland soldiers was indicative of Peter's character, and even up to last week, our Secretary was receiving correspondence from former national members of "C" Company in the Highlands, showing some 30 years on, their respect and remembrance of their former Commander. Truly exceptional credit to Major Harbeck.

Following the founding of our NGVR / PNGVR Association in 1989, Peter assisted me with advice and brotherly affection over the past 14 years. Well done Peter.

Whilst this issue of Harim Tok Tok was being compiled, our Association has suffered another sudden and unexpected loss. On the 13 February, 2005, Major Bill Kelly, MBE.ED passed away in hospital.

On the 17 February, family members and NGVR / PNGVR personnel gathered to bid their comrade, Bill, a final farewell. Major Kelly's casket was draped in the Australian flag and an Officer's ceremonial sword was laid on the top along with his service awards. A beret, chrome bayonet, and the Battalion and Papua New Guinea flags completed the formal arrangements. Major Bob Harvey-Hall, RFD.ED flew up from Melbourne and presented a PNGVR Tribute to Major Kelly.

'Bill Kelly was a special friend of mine. I first met him in 1953 at Murray Barracks, Port Moresby, the Headquarters of the Papua New Guinea Volunteer Rifles. Bill was one of the first Volunteers of the PNGVR, which was formed in 1951, and, along with other dedicated members, was part of the backbone of the Battalion as it evolved from a white man's Citizens Military Force unit into a wonderful cosmopolitan Battalion which began when we were allowed to enlist men of Chinese and Malay background and then the national citizens of Papua New Guinea. Bill Kelly was foremost in Port Moresby during those sometimes, for PNGVR, turbulent and interesting years.

In his PNGVR years, Bill was involved in studying for promotion examinations, attending military courses in Australia and at Murray Barracks, being part of examination boards and attending annual camps at such places as Goldie River, Mt Ambra, the Lae Showgrounds, in the foot hills at the back of Igam Barracks and at the last PNGVR camp at Finschhafen.

He also attended the 1969 camp at Igam Barracks, Lae, when the Battalion Colours were presented. Captain W Kelly, ED (Efficiency Decoration) was the Commander of No. 4 Guard on that brilliant day.

The then Capt Kelly went south for twelve months and transferred to the Queensland University Regiment on full time duty in the ARA as Adjutant to that Unit. He told that he took on quite a job, in that some of the Officers did not have the work ethic to the degree he had and he said that before he left to go back to PNG, he felt that he had won the battle. Bill returned to Port Moresby and resumed his work with his beloved PNGVR.

Bill volunteered for full time duty, CMF, in Vietnam and was posted to 1 Task Force, Nui Dat and attached to 9 Battalion Royal Australian Regiment where he was involved in operations in the field and the general wartime duties of an Infantry Unit.


I was Battalion 2 I/C when Lt Colonel Bill Harrington, as a matter of courtesy, told me he had applied for the award of the MBE (Ordinary Member of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire) for Bill. In part the award preamble stated......we have thought fit to nominate and appoint you an ordinary member of the military division of the most Excellent Order of the British Empire......This excellent work covered Bill's work with PNGVR and with the community, and this brings me to say that he was a most humane person in many respects; in the middle of the night the phone would ring at home and one of Bill's soldiers or a P&T employee would say, perchancemy wife has had a baby son and we would like to call him Bill.... Or someone would phone to say that so and so was in jail and would you please do something about it....Bill never hesitated to assist.

He remarked, during one of our infrequent telephone discussions, that the PNGVR motto 'Per Angusta ad Augusta— Through Trials to Triumph—was most fitting. When he thought of the early days in the formation of the unit, and then the great day when the Colours, with NGVR Battle Honours, were presented to the Battalion.

On the evening of Saturday 5th February, I phoned Bill to confirm some details of a story on the PNGVR Colours: We also talked about the mysterious burning down of the Q Store at Murray Barracks. Then he said, words to this effect. "I am going into hospital on Sunday for some exploratory surgery." I said that I would keep in touch through Aileen (Kelly) and see you on ANZAC Day. Bill replied, "I will talk to you by the end of the week and get off the phone as you are paying for it." Bill always told me to get off the phone after about 10 minutes of chin wagging.

Bill's last position with PNGVR was as Support Company Commander, a job which he performed In his usual efficient manner. He was a dedicated CMF soldier.

Well done Major Kelly. You were at the birth of PNGVR in Port Moresby in 1951 and you were in Canberra in 1974 when the Battalion's Colours were handed over for safekeeping to the Board of Trustees of the Australian War Memorial. We will miss you at our AGM's, our Reunions and on ANZAC Day and other times when PNGVR fellows are together.



'MONTEVIDEO MARU'

Built in Nagasaki in 1927 for the Osaka Shosen Kaisha Shipping Line's South American service - 7,236 tons. Diesel powered. Commandeered by the Japanese Navy at the outbreak of war and sent to Rabaul in June 1942 to transport Australian and allied soldiers and civilians back to Japan.

The 'Montevideo Maru', with its POW's on board, sailed from Rabaul late June 1942 and was torpedoed by a US submarine at 0230 hours on the 1 July 1942, off the Luzon coast in the Philippines. The ship quickly sunk with the loss of all 1036 prisoners of war on board. However this is another story.

Rudy and his friend worked for the Japanese for a few months until heavy bombing levelled the area. The constant bombing made the family move to the hills south of and a half-hours walk inland from lapamger, which is about 20 miles from Rabaul on the north coast. They spent time in their gardens and dodging allied bombs. The Japanese knew they were there and Rudy, with a Malayan boy, had the daily job of collecting the roll from lapamgor, calling the roll in the area and returning it to the Japanese Police. Fortunately no one from Rudy's family was killed or injured in the bombing. Friends and members of other families were not so fortunate.

Rudy recalls the times they would creep into Japanese tunnels in the area and steel gunpowder. They would make rope from coconut husks and use this with the gunpowder to burn off Japanese rice that was growing in the hills. The trick was to creep into the 2-3 ft high rice fields, place the powder in a good position, and connect it to the fuse of coconut rope, light it, and RUN. By the time the gunpowder fired and burnt the rice crop, they were well gone.

During this period Rudy saw many executions of Australian, American and New Zealand airmen by the Japanese. After the war, a Colonel Horton from War Graves, visited Rabaul and Rudy was able to show him 32 graves of executed airmen. These airmen were either beheaded, shot or bayoneted to death.

Rudy also showed Colonel Horton where the Australians embarked for the 'Montevideo Maru', the location which was later marked by a suitably inscribed Japanese gun. It was still there when Rudy left for Australia in 1975. Perhaps someone can confirm whether it is still in place.

After the war, Rudy was educated at St Josephs College in Rabaul and later apprenticed with and worked for the Department of Works and Housing and then the Department of Civil Aviation as an electrician. About the time of receiving his Australian Citizenship in 1964, Rudy joined the PNGVR

RUDY BUCKLEY - PNGVR

Rudy was a 12 year old boy living in Chinatown, Rabaul, when the Japanese invaded on the 22nd January, 1942. The invasion was swift but the situation settled very quickly as the Japanese built up Rabaul as a major base.

Rudy, of Irish and Tolai parentage, was employed with a Chinese friend by the Japanese to look after their cooking fires along the Coral Wharf Road, which was about 3 miles from their home. Their job was to fan the fires to minimise the smoke. They worked from 3.00am through to midday for a weekly payment of a sock full of rice each. Rudy had to speak Japanese, which he had mastered by the end of the war.

One day near the end of June 1942, Rudy and his friend were attracted by Australian soldiers being marched and trucked to the nearby wharf in Rabaul harbour. The Japanese were forcing the soldiers into barges to be taken out to the Japanese Naval Prisonship, 'Montevideo Maru', which was anchored out in the harbour, for transhipment to Japan as slave labour.

The Australian soldiers were subdued as they were being beaten by the Japanese guards with rifle butts and bayonets.

Rudy and his friend moved down to the wharf where the soldiers were standing prior to embarkation. One particular young soldier saw Rudy and his friend, smiled and threw them a handkerchief. Rudy quickly picked it up and kept it. They could not speak with him because of Japanese intimidation. The handkerchief was of a light colour with some dark stains and contained the name of the soldier and his service number, written in indian ink. Details of the soldier may be found at the end of this story.

After the invasion many of the Australian soldiers (NGVR, 2/22nd and attached units) were captured around Rabaul and the south coast of New Britain. They were housed in tunnels on the harbour side of Tunnel Hill. It was from here where the prisoners had marched.

Rudy kept the handkerchief, as it was a valuable memento of the Australian soldiers who had come to Rabaul to protect them from the Japanese. It was not until much later that Rudy spoke about the handkerchief, and, in 2004, presented it to our Association to be part of our historic memorabilia collection. The background of the soldier who owned the handkerchief is being further research to see whether there are surviving relatives. Steps are also being taken to preserve the handkerchief.
